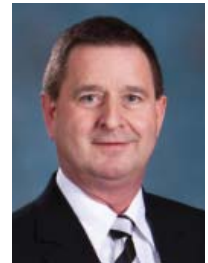

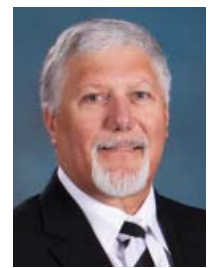

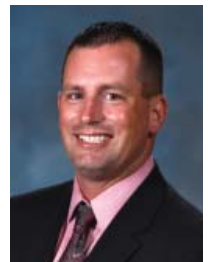

District Meetings – A Very Important Time for Your Organization and Your School

During the first and second weeks of November, the six Nebraska School Activities Association Districts will hold meetings to discuss proposals for changes to the Constitution and By-laws of the organization. These changes to the governing structure of the NSAA are written, presented, discussed and ultimately voted on by the member schools that are present. This long-standing representative process has been a hallmark for the effectiveness of the NSAA. It is essential to continuing the NSAA tradition of being responsive to the needs of our members.

During the District meetings this year, all members schools will be given a chance to react and respond to the work conducted over the course of an entire year by a committee of members charged with considering Restructuring, Governance and Representation. The 24 members of the committee, representing all Districts in the State, as well as all members of the Board of Directors, have worked diligently to address the concerns of member schools in regard to the ability to pass legislation affecting their particular classification of school. The committee was chaired by long time District 2 Board of Director, Dr. Bob Reznicek.

The proposal that will be introduced at each District meeting will outline the results of the Committee's work. Essentially this proposal allows each NSAA classification (A, B, C or D) to pass legislation that pertains to that class only. The proposal will allow each class of school to introduce and vote on issues important to them. Schools that participate in activities in more than one class will also be able to vote on any issue that affects their school. Essential to this process is the fact that each proposal must not materially affect the finances of the NSAA or change the Constitution in regard to eligibility, hence only by-laws that pertain to activities may be considered. A very important part of any proposal is a "financial impact statement" and only those with such a statement will be allowed to proceed to the membership of that class for a vote.

Each class will hold a "Classification Caucus" annually to determine the proposals they would like to consider for approval. Once a classification of schools, through their caucus, decides on what proposals to present for consideration, a "Classification Caucus Review Committee" will study them. This committee will determine if a proposal qualifies to move forward for a vote.

Although these proposals will not be considered for a vote at either the November or January District Meetings, it will certainly be to the benefit of the membership to discuss these proposals at these meetings and allow all members of the NSAA to know and understand the rationale that went into the decision to present the measure under consideration.

Finally, each proposal will be voted on by the membership of that classification of school, following the Representative Assembly. This vote will be conducted through a mail-in ballot and each measure must receive a two thirds (2/3) affirmative vote of the members of that classification. For example, a vote affecting Class B basketball, must receive 20 votes (32 Class B schools) to be enacted.

Further study remains for a smaller, sub-committee of the original committee in regard to NSAA District boundaries and a recommendation will be made for any changes to be considered by the Board of Directors in September 2012.

The NSAA legislative process has proven, over time, to be responsive to the needs of our members and adjustments to the NSAA Constitution and By-laws reflect this. Take the time to read all the proposals for District meetings carefully and discuss them with the coaches, sponsors and administrators they affect. Your vote can and does make a difference in the future of your organization, the Nebraska School Activities Association.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

We have audited the accompanying statements of financial position of Nebraska School Activities Association (a nonprofit organization) as of July 31, 2011 and 2010, and the related statements of activities and cash flows for the years then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Association's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audits to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Nebraska School Activities Association as of July 31, 2011 and 2010, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Note 1 - Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies:

Nature of Activities - The Nebraska School Activities Association (Association) is a nonprofit organization established to select, develop and direct interscholastic events and to regulate administration of those events. The judicial and administrative authority of the Association resides in a Board of Directors comprised of six members, one from each of the Association's six districts within the State. Most of the Association's revenue is derived from activity fees.

Income Tax Status - The Association is exempt from Federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, however, income from certain activities not directly related to the Association's tax-exempt purpose is subject to taxation as unrelated business income. The Association has also been classified as an entity that is not a private foundation within the meaning of Section 509(a) and qualifies for deductible contributions.

Basis of Accounting - The financial statements of the Association have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and, accordingly, reflect all significant receivables, payables, and other liabilities.

Cash Equivalents - The Association considers all liquid investments with original maturities of one month or less to be cash equivalents. At July 31, 2011 and 2010, cash equivalents consisted of checking, savings, and broker money market accounts.

Investments - Held-to-maturity investments, which include any security for which the Association has the positive intent and ability to hold until maturity, are carried at historical cost. All investments are certificates of deposit.

Risk Concentration - As of July 31, 2011 and 2010, the Association's cash and investment balances at particular financial institutions exceeded federally insured limits by \$994,048 and \$1,152,346, respectively. As of July 31, 2011 and 2010, these balances were collateralized with U.S. Treasury obligations or federal agency bonds in the amount of \$518,563 and \$1,125,545, respectively.

Inventory - Inventories are recorded at cost, on a first-in/first-out basis, and consist of publications for sale and distribution to schools, supplies and stationery for office use.

Revenue Recognition - Revenue and expenses are recorded on the accrual basis. Revenue received for future dues and fees is deferred to the applicable year.

Basis of Presentation - Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, "Financial Statements of Not-For-Profit Organizations". Under SFAS No. 117, the Association is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets. The Association does not have any restricted net assets.

Use of Estimates - Financial statements prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America

require the use of management's estimates, most notably the useful lives of fixed assets.

Receivables - Are stated at the amount management expects to collect from outstanding balances. Accordingly, no allowance for doubtful accounts is required. If it is probable accounts are uncollectible, they are charged to operations and an allowance is established when that determination is made.

Subsequent Events - The Association has evaluated subsequent events through September 29, 2011, which is the date the financial statements were issued.

Note 2 - Property, Buildings and Equipment:

The Association capitalizes all acquisitions of property and equipment with a useful life greater than one year. Property and equipment are stated at cost. Depreciation is provided on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets.

Note 3 - Loan Origination Fee:

On May 18, 2010, the Association incurred origination fees totaling \$25,201 to refinance revenue bonds issued in 2007. These costs are being amortized over an eight year period. Accumulated amortization as of July 31, 2011 and 2010, amounted to \$4,725 and \$1,575, respectfully. Amortization expense for the years ended July 31, 2011 and 2010, was \$3,150 and \$1,575, respectfully.

Note 4 - Capital Leases:

The Association leases its office facilities from the City of Lincoln, Nebraska (the City), under a capital lease. The economic substance of the lease is that the Association is financing the acquisition of the office facility through the lease, and accordingly, it is recorded in the Association's assets and liabilities.

The Association leases office equipment under a capital lease that expires in 2015. The asset and the liability under the capital lease was recorded at the lower of present value of the minimum lease payments. The asset is amortized over its lease term.

Amortization of building and office equipment under capital leases amounted to \$87,994 and \$86,496 for the years ended July 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Amortization is included in depreciation expense in the accompanying financial statements.

Note 5 - Promissory Note:

On July 17, 2007, the City issued industrial development revenue bonds in the amount of \$3,500,000, to finance construction of the leased facility. On May 18, 2010, the City and the Association refinanced the bonds with an Industrial Development Promissory Revenue Note, Series 2010 in the amount of \$3,362,000, at an interest rate of 5.05%. The Asso-

ciation's lease provides for minimum payments sufficient to cover the City's debt service and related expenses. The lease terminates May 20, 2028, the maturity date of the bonds. The bonds are secured by the leased asset and the guarantee of the Association.

Note 6 - Rental Operations:

The Association leases office space under non-cancellable operating leases with terms ranging from five to ten years. The leases contain renewal options and require the lessees to pay for repairs, maintenance and utilities.

Note 7 - Operating Leases:

The Association is the lessee of automobiles under operating leases expiring in various months through 2014. Vehicle lease expense amounted to \$20,436 and \$25,860 for the years ended July 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Note 8 - Retirement Benefits:

The Association has established a defined contribution retirement plan for its employees. The Association will match the employee's contribution up to a maximum of 7.5% of their annual salary. Employer contributions are 100% vested. Contributions are charged to retirement expense in the year incurred and amounted to \$64,536 and \$60,249 for the years ended July 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Note 9 - Functional Allocation of Expenses:

The costs of providing the various programs and activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

Note 10 - Compensated Absences:

The Association is liable for unused vacation time not used in the following year up to a maximum of twenty days for most employees. Any vacation time not used by the employee by the following May 31, is forfeited. As of July 31, 2011 and 2010, potential unused vacation time amounted to \$28,402 and \$22,600, respectively.

The Association is liable for unused sick leave for qualified full-time employees with 10 or more years of continuous service. Unused sick leave up to a maximum of twenty days is compensatory for qualified employees at retirement or voluntary leave. As of July 31, 2011 and 2010, potential unused compensatory sick leave amounted to \$23,780 and \$21,880, respectively.

Note 11 - Donated Materials and Services:

For the years ended July 31, 2011 and 2010, contributed athletic supplies amounted to \$54,225 and \$45,954, respectively, and are included in the revenue of each activity that benefited from the supplies contributed. A significant portion of the Association's functions, including tournament oversight, is conducted by volunteers. The value of this contributed time is not reflected in the accompanying financial statements since the volunteers' time does not meet the criteria for recognition under SFAS No. 116, Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made.

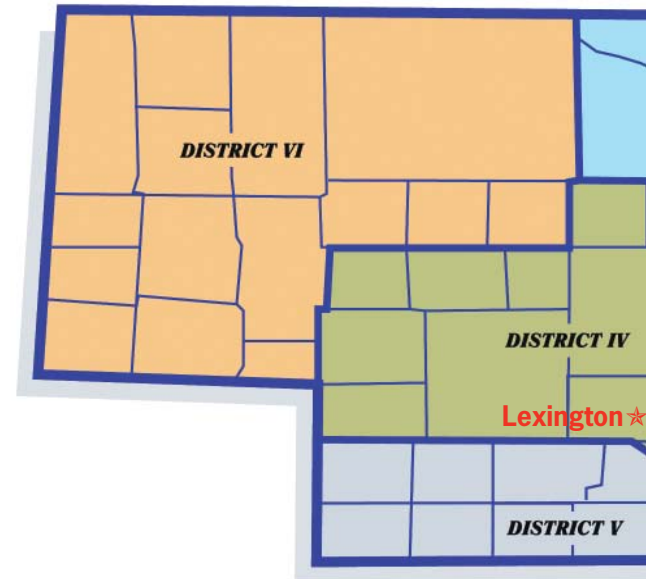

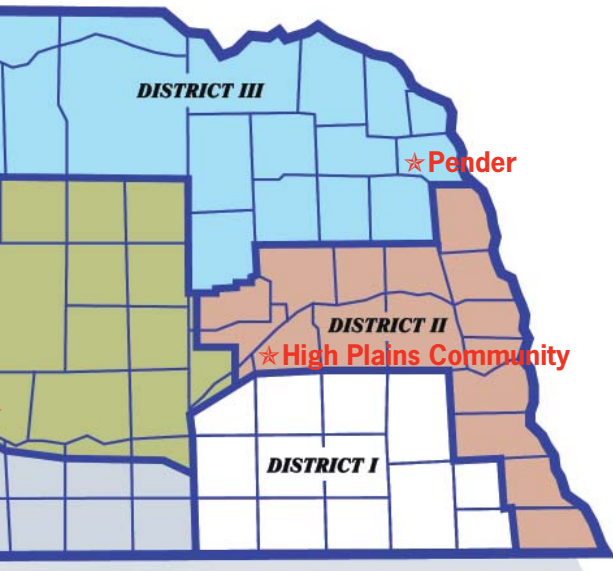

Award Program Requirements

A nominated student must be a varsity player or organizational leader who has played a significant role on the team or in the organizational activity during the seasons nominations are accepted. A nominated student must have a minimum Grade Point Average, in all curricular subjects, of 93% or 3.7 on a 4.0-point scale or the equivalent. NSAA high schools or their cooperative sponsorship (school-unit) may nominate a maximum of two students per NSAA activity program. Students who meet these requirements and are nominated by their school administration shall be awarded the NSAA Academic All-State Award for that activity. Students may be nominated in more than ONE activity during the year. There are no age or year-in-school restrictions for students as long as they meet NSAA eligibility requirements.
